HECC Turns 20

Hoosier Educational Computer Coordinators (HECC) had its beginnings in 1986 during an ICE conference at North Central High School when Tom Bauer was asked to moderate a forum for Computer Coordinators. Over fifty frustrated individuals attended the forum and cheered at the suggestion that there was a need for the formation of a group that was dedicated to support the specific needs of Computer Coordinators. Within moments of the call to organize, members of the audience were offering dollar bills to help with the creation of a mailing list of interested individuals and to support the formation of a governing board.

Two years later, HECC officially became a Special Interest Group (SIG) of ICE. Initially, HECC had a "conference" on the old IdeaNet or a blog in today's Internet terms. A newsletter was published four times per year.

After an ill-fated attempt to hold a vendor fair in 1993, the conference was cancelled and the money was gone. The death of HECC was predicted, but in 1995 ICE purchased \$3,000 worth of vendor bags that HECC had ordered and not used. They were passed out at the ICE conference.

With money in hand, HECC now needed a plan to succeed. Under the leadership of then President Dennis Bagley, the HECC board met for a planning retreat. A facilitator was hired to assist in developing a mission statement, to help set goals, and create strategies to meet those goals.

HECC had finally taken root and has continued to grow with each year's conference. After several years of successful conferences at the Indianapolis Airport Holiday Inn, the conference was moved to Union Station in 2004.

This year HECC celebrates its' 20th anniversary. It has expanded and grown to be known as the voice of technology coordinators across the state. We look forward to the challenges of the next twenty years and hope to see you at the Conference on November 16th and 17th.
